



Hazel Addie (Hash) Warp, stunt rider, movie double, sister, aunt, and friend, passed away on August 26, 2008 at Livingston Memorial

Hospital. She was 93 years young. Hazel was born November 11, 1914 in Harlowton, Montana to Colonel Lee and Carrie Irene (Young) Hash. She attended country schools in Harlowton. She spent many years in Culver City and Bakersfield, California working in her sister's stables. She was a stunt rider and movie double in several movies like: Gone with the Wind, National Velvet, Ben-Hur, and many more. In 2001, she was recognized with a star on Main Street in front of The Rialto Theatre in Bozeman. She also took part in teaching stars such as Elizabeth Taylor how to ride horses, and was a part of many Rose Bowl parades.

While in California she married her first husband, James Wharton, June 6, 1954. He passed away August 26, 1960. After leaving California in 1965, she moved to Marion, Virginia and was a volunteer nurse for the Red Cross before returning to Bozeman in 1969.

She married Lars Warp in Bozeman July 8, 1969. He passed away in 1983.

Hazel remained in Bozeman until June 2001 when she moved into the Livingston Health and Rehab Center. She resided there until the time of her death.

Hazel lived a full and adventurous life. She loved her horses and telling stories of them and training them, and of her days in the movies. She never forgot one of their names. She loved watching old friends act in westerns. She loved playing cards and her Sunday drives with her little brother, Bob. She also enjoyed all of her home care people and nurses and doctors who helped her so much over the years and gave her family many years of memories with her.

Hazel is survived by: one brother, Bob Hash of Bozeman, and several nieces and nephews.
